

# A better way to use your tax refund

## 1 Beat back debt

College tuition is expensive and is likely to remain so. Regular additions, however small, to a college savings program can help make college more affordable for your children.

## 4 Boost your retirement security

When it comes to saving for retirement, every little bit helps. Consider having less income tax withheld from your pay in 2024 so you won't receive a big tax refund. Then increase your contributions to your employer's retirement plan. Your tax preparer can help you figure out how much you need to have withheld to avoid penalties or having a large balance due when you file your 2024 return.
